Principal's Message (Cont'd)

Halloween Costumes

Of course, Halloween will be upon us in no time, which means we will all have an excuse to dress up as animals, pirates, witches, or superheroes. Here are a couple of guidelines we use when it comes to costumes at Stoney Creek:

- Throughout the day, we must be able recognize every child for safety reasons. This means that students are not to wear **full face masks** or other coverings that would make identification difficult for the whole afternoon. It is fine for them to wear them for the "parade" (time TBD), but after that, they will be asked to remove them. Half masks are often OK as long as we can see the child's eyes.
- **Detachable swords, light sabres, or other such "weapons"** are not allowed at school, even if they are brought in a bag, so please leave them at home so the students are not even tempted to take them out. Of course, this again has to do with student safety and it avoids putting staff in the awkward situation of disappointing students by having to take the "weapon" away for the day.
- In addition, we ask that students do not wear extremely "scary" costumes...again, common sense judgement is needed here. For example, dressing up as Pennywise, the clown from IT or Squid Game Guards would not be an appropriate costume for elementary school, although coming as a clown is just fine. We want all students to enjoy the day so don't want to frighten the youngest of our students.
- And finally, just a reminder that "<u>culture is not a costume</u>". For more information on this, check out this article.

On **Thursday**, **Oct**. **31**st, we will encourage students, parents, and staff to bring costumes to show off and will give more information next week on what to expect. We'll likely have some sort of parade, a Jack-O-Lantern competition and possibly even a door decorating challenge, but more information will be coming, closer to the time.

What is a Community School? FAQ's



to Stoney Creek Community School!

Community schools are regular public schools with a special belief in, and emphasis on *community involvement*.

Is the curriculum different in a community school?

We follow the same curriculum as other public elementary schools across BC.

However, what you might also notice in community schools is that we have many **partnerships and programs** with community organizations. These programs help to **enhance and extend learning opportunities** during the school day and into the afterschool/evening hours for ALL

In a nutshell, **YES**, the Community Council is the same thing as a PAC.

However, it is called a "Community Council" because we are a community school. We also invite community partners to join us at our council meetings to help provide input and make decisions on our community. We often hear updates from Bby Parks & Rec or our Youth Centre as well.

We are fortunate that in Burnaby, Community School Coordinators are also **certified teachers.** Being a teacher helps to connect our teaching background and experience with our work in community development. We also work closely with parents and our community partners to plan and coordinate programs and events for our school and neighbourhood so that we can strengthen our community. **At Stoney Creek, Taryn Briscoe is the Community School Coordinator**(*Taryn.Briscoe@burnabyschools.ca*).

We also have TWO offices at Stoney Creek, the main school office by the entrance doors, and the **Community Office** down the hallway on the lower floor. Please feel free to stop by the Community Office **if you have any questions** about community programs and events, family support services, financial support services, youth information, early learning programs, after school programs, adult education opportunities, and MORE! **Please also feel free to drop by just to say hello and also to meet Ms. Marghi, our Community Office Secretary** (Leila.Marghi@burnabyschools.ca)!





What is a Community Council?

The Stoney Creek Community Council (SCCC) is called a "Community Council" rather than a "Parent Advisory Council (PAC)" because Stoney Creek is a community school. One of the many important aspects of community schools is that Stoney Creek parents AND local residents/community members are welcome to attend the meetings to identify needs and initiate programs and services available through the school to support the school and local community. In addition, there is a broad scope for volunteer activity in a community school, with staff and residents working in an environment of cooperation to make the school a productive and comfortable place to share in.



As parents/guardians of Stoney Creek students, you are automatically a "member" of the Community Council and are always welcome to attend any of the monthly meetings to find out more school and community programs and activities, to hear updates from Mr. Gurney and Ms. Briscoe, and to meet other parents.

What You Need to Know

TRAFFIC SAFETY, DROPPING OFF AND PICKING UP STUDENTS:

Keeping our students safe before and after school is a priority.

- Parents are encouraged to walk their children to and from school to reduce traffic congestion.
- Student crossing guards will once again be stationed at the crosswalk in front of the school before and after school. Please be aware of their presence.
- If you do drive to school, please obey all signs at the front of the school.
- Please use the designated parking spots along Beaverbrook Crescent and avoid the front of the school as it impairs the vision of our crossing guards.
- Our crosswalk provides a small drop-off area just past the crosswalk for those parents who need it.
- Please limit drop-off time to accommodate other cars.
- The parking lot is for staff only and is NOT to be used for dropping off and picking up students, turning your car around, or for accessing the YMCA Daycare.
- Please refrain from walking through the school parking lot to the playground. We have had some near misses in the past with students dashing between the parked cars.

There is no supervision before and after school, so students should arrive close to their scheduled start times and leave the school grounds shortly after they have been dismissed.

WHAT NOT TO BRING TO SCHOOL:


Toys, electronic devices, trading cards or anything of value should be left at home to avoid loss or damage. **Cell phones are**not permitted during school hours. Students who have a phone are asked to keep them turned off and put away during the day. Should you need to contact your child during the school day, we ask that you call our main office at 604-296-9031. Any bikes or scooters brought to school need to be locked up in the under-cover area beside the parking lot. Students are to walk bikes and scooters when on school grounds.

STUDENT INFORMATION:

In order to ensure student safety please make sure the school has all relevant information up to date. This includes any medical and safety concerns as well as phone numbers and emergency contact information.

PARENT COMMUNICATION:

Having an open line of communication between home and school is crucial for student success. Please stay in touch with your child's teacher on a regular basis and feel free to contact the school if you have any questions or concerns. We send our notices and newsletters home via e-mail in order to reduce paper consumption. The FAIR Play Program has multiple options to apply that reflect the diversity of our Burnaby residents. To qualify, you must live in Burnaby and meet the one of the following:

- You receive government income assistance (federal or provincial)
- You meet the income criteria (click <u>here</u> for more details)
- You are a child with a disability
- You are a Canadian Ukraine Authorization for Emergency Travel (CUAET) applicant or a privately sponsored refugee
- You have an agency referral from a trusted partner





How to Register:

Proof of Income will be required:

 an operator; for an automated service, call
 1.800.267.6999. You can also access your Proof of
 Income Statement online at CRA My Account > My
 Account for Individuals > Sign In > Tax Returns >
 Proof of Income Statement (this is the C-Print doc)
- If you are on Income Assistance (Welfare), please request a Release of Information from your Ministry Office. This will replace the C-Print.

You will also be required to bring:

- Identification for each child (e.g. BC Services Card/Care Card, birth certificate, child tax benefit statement, passport or Permanent Resident card)
- Proof of current address (e.g. bills from Fortis, Hydro, internet or phone provider, or current residential tenancy agreement)
